What do you consider to be the most important contribution that your religion has made/ is making/ can make to the common good in a pluralist society?

While all religions are contributing to keeping alive the "God Question" in the public realm one way or another, Lutheran Protestantism on the one hand has shaped many societies culturally through its rich church music heritage; on the other hand it has substantially helped the educational systems flourish. Eventually, Lutheranism has come around to advocate soci(et)al justice and peace.

Music and Religion; Hymnology; Christian ethical education in the schools and churches

Ethical as well as aesthetical education; interreligious dialogue; boosting diversity competence
